Rise to the New U.S. Immigration Challenges with FAPA

FAPA's well-known mission is to protect and strengthen the U.S.-Taiwan relationship, and promote U.S.-Taiwan security in the East Asia region. It is also devoted to advancing the welfare of the Taiwanese American and their compatriots in Taiwan. One of FAPA's major accomplishments is to establish Taiwan as an independent entity in U.S. immigration visa allotments. Now, this hard-earned quota

is facing challenges in the U.S. Congress through two bills, <u>\$386\$</u> and <u>H.R.1044</u>, from other interest groups. The proposed legislation seeks to change the way immigrant visas are allotted and disregard the existing country specific cap starting FY 2020, particularly in **employment-based immigration**, with the great majority of visas going to India and China applicants. There is an urgent need to take timely action to preserve our immigration interests!
