## NATPA President Conference Address 2018

親愛的 NATPA 會員與朋友:

首先讓我代表北美洲台灣人教授協會歡迎來自各處的會員與朋友，由於您的參與，我們才有機會在八月四、五兩日於華府之鄰 Arlington，正式展開北美州台灣人教授協會第 38 屆年會。今年大會的主題為 Strengthen Taiwan's Democracy & International Relations，也就是「深化台灣民主，立足國際社會」。我們刻意選擇華府地區做為大會舉辦的地點，以突顯川普總統簽署《台灣旅行法》的時代意義。

去年我們有幸邀請到對台灣極為友善的前美國駐聯合國波頓 (John Bolton) 大使到 NATPA 大會演講，讓他有機會親自感受北美台灣學人對台灣建國的主張與熱情，相信一定印象深刻，如今波頓被任命為美國國家安全顧問，想必 NATPA 大會的經驗對他日後的對台政策會有正面的影響。川普政府的表現讓我們相信台美關係進一步正常化已水到渠成，但另一方面，川普政府在貿易上以及在東北亞與南海水域和中國的角力，局勢複雜，台灣的前途仍充滿不確定性。面對這樣既新又渾沌的局勢，我們需要更理性的分析我們的處境，既不冒進，也不錯失良機，站穩腳步，才能如大會主題，進一步深化台灣民主，立足國際社會。



大會請來多位台美的專家學者來分析台美關係的前景，有喬治華盛頓大學研究國際事務的 Robert Sutter 教授，他將分析川普政府對台灣的支持態度；又如對軍事有深入研究的資深智庫研究員 Richard Fisher，他將闡述中國對世界的威脅。英國倫敦政經學院台灣研究計畫室主任施芳瓏博士，將探討太陽花運動如何連接台灣的民主與國際關係。來自日本京都大學的張智程教授，將談論台灣在美日關係中扮演的角色。政治學者葉耀元教授，將討論一旦中國犯台，台灣民意準備一戰的態度所代表的意義。長期活躍於華府地區的王能祥長老也將分享《台灣關係法》的精神及貢獻。

來自國內的專家學者則有目前任職商業發展研究院董事長的前台南市許添財市長，將討論台灣產業的困境與轉型。以南嘉生為筆名的知名政論家林修正教授，將以經濟的角度探討台灣人自我認同的追求。大會也安排觀賞揭露中國孔子學院控管學術以輸出文化統戰的記錄片《假孔子之名》，導演秋旻女士將親臨會場，分享拍片的動機與經過。

我們也將頒發第四屆廖述宗教授紀念獎，這是海外對長期奉獻台灣的台灣人最重要的獎項。今年經過委員會仔細的篩選討論，由高俊明牧師與林昶佐立委分別獲得「長期貢獻獎」與「青年貢獻獎」。高俊明牧師的年事已高，不克前來領獎，但大會仍將舉辦隆重的頒獎儀式，並請代理人發表得獎者的感言。林昶佐立委則在百忙之中，特地安排前來領獎，以表達對廖述宗紀念獎的重視與敬意。我們也將同時公佈今年廖述宗研究獎的得主。

頒獎典禮之後，我們將進入大會另一個重頭戲，年輕學者計畫 (Young Scholar Program)，今年我們選出 20 位優秀年輕學者，邀請他們前來報告他們的所學與研究，全部環繞在台灣的當今議題，從政治、科技、醫療、藝術，到歷史文化，應有盡有，保證精彩。過去礙於時間限制，參加大會的會員與來賓對這些年輕學者的精彩報告往往感到意猶未盡，今年我們特別加長 YSP 的時段，讓他們有更多的時間暢談。

會後，我們將安排前往雙橡園參訪用餐。過去雙橡園與代表處一直是國府以踐踏台灣來幻想代表中國的象徵，台美人一向消極拒絕接觸。然而時代變動，台灣政府已在地化與民主化，加上台派政黨二度執政，或有理想與現實上的差距，但共同為台灣的前途盡力，才能最大化反中國併吞的本錢。我們在討論之後決定參訪雙橡園，與高代表交換意見，此行饒富意義，是一個新時代的開始。

除了正式的節目，同樣重要的是我們私下的相處時間，會員與來賓互動，我們也希望能依有興趣的議題組成討論小組，利用空檔或徹夜暢談台灣種種問題，如年改問題、台大校長任用問題、能源問題、正名問題、轉型正義問題，等等。眾所皆知，經歷馬政府八年幾乎刨根式的傾中，千瘡百孔，台派取回政權後必須花費數倍的力氣亡羊補牢，能否在短時間內堵住破口尚不得而知，但已有台派政客不待喘息，天真地認為情勢已一片大好，四處充滿冒進的呼聲，這些呼聲或可做為台灣外交與改革的後盾，但過於簡化問題而不可行，反而會弱化台派政權改革所需的支持力量。許許多多台灣的問題，在此一言難盡，見面時定當報告所知所思，互相切磋，理性討論，認清台灣的危機與希望，為台灣謀，NATPA 責無旁貸。

最後，我們要感謝在 Baltimore/DC 分會長陳慧玲博士的帶領下，動員了 Baltimore/DC 熱心的會員全心全力地投入，替我們安排了食宿旅館、會場、娛樂節目、會後旅遊，等等。在此向大會辛苦的籌備人員至上的謝意。我們也要感謝鄭麗伶博士設計大會手冊與大會流程；周鉅原教授與丁弘彬教授接洽聯絡講者。要感謝的人太多，無法一一在此列出，沒有他們的付出，就不會有今天的大會。謝謝。

在大家的努力下，希望大會能帶給各位愉快且珍貴的回憶，也希望 NATPA 的年會能年年保持自己的特色，成為台美學人關心台灣的思想饗宴。最後，祝各位有個美好的夏天，身體健康，萬事如意。

## 紀念賴義雄教授 (1940.7.24 – 2018.4.30)

2018 年 8 月 4 日，北美洲臺灣人教授協會第 38 屆年會，Arlington, VA

賴義雄教授 (Dr. Robert Yi-Hsiung Lai) 1940 年出生於基隆，臺灣大學土木系畢業後赴美深造，主攻水利工程及流體力學，於 1969 年取得西北大學博士學位。隨後到紐約州立大學水牛城分校 (State University of New York-Buffalo) 擔任博士後研究一年，1970 年前往威斯康辛大學密爾瓦基分校 (University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee) 教書，時間長達十年。

執教的這段時間，賴教授與海外台獨人士多有交往，共同關心台灣的時事與前途。1975 年參加國建會（國家建設研究會）返台，結識黨外人士康寧祥，允諾在美國推廣批評台灣時政的《臺灣政論》雜誌，成為該雜誌的海外總代表，並設立了 16 個分區代表。但這份繼《自由中國》之後最重要的雜誌旋即被國民黨政府查禁，賴教授也因此成為黑名單上的人士，直到 1982 年母喪才准予單次入境奔喪。



1979 年爆發美麗島事件，1980 年賴教授參與北美洲臺灣人教授協會（NATPA）的創會工作，為創會理事之一，次年辭去教職，擔任 NATPA 副會長，同時也進入華府 TRW 公司工作，服務達 20 年。TRW 為美國重要的國防工業大廠，賴教授肩負美國國防的機密工作，為潛艇建造與戰略專家。

1986 年任 NATPA 第七屆會長，時逢台灣組黨、解嚴的民主時刻，賴教授帶領 NATPA 為台灣的民主做出貢獻。那時仍在黑名單上的賴教授，再度以奔喪之名返台。在台其間，賴教授以其個人的影響力，奔走串連，團結黨外人士，共同催生了民進黨。

2000 年政黨首次輪替，賴教授也從 TRW 退休，毫不猶豫返台奉獻所長，2003 年出任新轉型的國家實驗研究院董事，2006 接任無給職的董事長。2006 年在民視開闢「科技台灣新國力」電視節目，每星期播出一次，賴教授以國研院董事長的身分粉墨登場，當了二十六集的主持人，介紹臺灣科技發展，廣受好評。2008 年政黨再度輪替後賴教授返美，但不忘以各種方式幫助台灣。2016 再度擔起重任，出任華府台灣智庫 GTI 董事長。不幸 2018 年 4 月 27 日在家中風昏迷，送醫後 4 月 30 日過世，享年 78 歲。追思會於 8 月 3 日在賴教授最喜歡的馬里蘭州 Brookside Garden 舉行，公園內的玫瑰花園 (Rose Garden) 有紀念賴教授的紀念樹及紀念碑。

賴教授精彩的一生，是每位台灣人的典範，NATPA 有他的引導，我們堅定地走了 38 年的歲月，我們在此懷念他，定不能忘記賴教授生前時時呼籲台灣人要「攜手同心、一致對外」，以「我們都是臺灣人」的想法推動臺灣發展，認清中國才是台灣唯一的敵人。

### 紀念儀式主持人：柯耀宗博士

柯博士是賴義雄教授超過 50 年的老友，為台灣大學與美國西北大學同窗。柯博士為台灣台中人，台中一中，台灣大學化工學士，美國 Kansas State University 化工碩士，於 1968 年獲得美國西北大學化工博士。之後服務於 Gulf Oil，1973 年進杜邦公司服務，任至杜邦公司亞太地區 Technology Licensing 總監。自杜邦退休後，應邀回台擔任新光合成纖維公司總經理，推動公司轉型及多元化經營，創設友輝光電，邦新工業，達輝光電等公司，擔任其總經理及董事長。柯博士熱愛台灣，長年關心台灣前途，1984 年擔任美東台灣人夏令會總召集人，2016-2018 年連續擔任美西臺灣人夏令會理事會顧問。現任 FAPA Fund Board of Trustee 及 member of FAPA Finance Committee。

## In Loving Memory of Dr. Hu, Sheng-Cheng 胡勝正 (1940.8.5 – 2018.7.10)

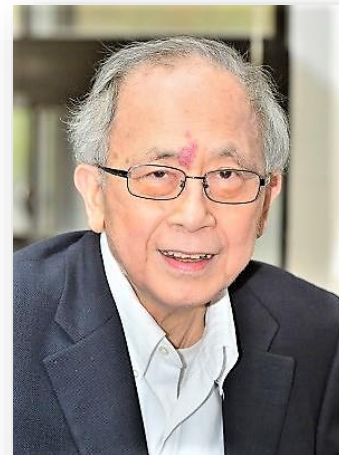
### 哲人仙逝，友情長存—弔念同學勝正兄

今年六月回台舉辦第十四屆金融與經濟政策研討會期間，我打電話給勝正兄並關心他的健康，我問是否可到他家探訪他，他跟我說身體不太好，等到下次我回國再來看他；同天，我也特別打電話給胡大嫂詢問勝正兄的病況，她告訴我勝正兄的病況相當嚴重；想不到我回美之後，勝正兄突然在 7/10 辭世，我深感悲傷與不捨。同時我也希望胡大嫂及其家人能節哀。

勝正兄與我同時在 1958 年考進台大經濟系，在此 60 年間，勝正兄與我有很多愉快的回憶以及為共同的目標奮鬥。1963 年，勝正兄與我同時考進台大經濟研究所，並住在台大第 4 宿舍同一寢室，我記得在 1963 年某天晚上，我的腎結石發作，極為痛苦不堪，勝正兄在半夜陪我到台大急診室，然後送我回到寢室。在此期間，勝正兄與台大經濟系小我們一屆的朱敏惠小姐交往，他常常跟我們提起與朱敏惠小姐交往的情況與進展，所以我很早就認識胡大嫂—朱敏惠女士。

勝正兄在 1964 年台大經濟研究所畢業後，直接就申請到美國羅徹斯特大學經濟系的優厚獎學金，並負笈到美國留學，1968 年畢業後到美國普渡大學任教，在普渡大學任職期間，曾任系主任，教導很多博士生，他的高徒之一，Professor James Winder 現在在美國羅格斯大學任教，是我的同事。



勝正兄於 1996 年從普渡大學退休，出任中央研究院經濟學研究所所長。勝正兄從此花了很多心血，研究台灣的經濟情勢，並提出寶貴的建議。在前總統陳水扁執政期間，勝正兄曾擔任經建會及金管會主委，對台灣的財經政策有很大的貢獻。在此期間，勝正兄就開始與現任總統蔡英文有密切的互動。2016 年，蔡英文當選總統之後，勝正兄與彭淮南、林全及何美月為蔡英文總統的四位最重要財經幕僚。2017 年林全內閣提出前瞻計畫時，勝正兄就提醒政府，對前瞻計畫要努力及有效執行，若執行成果不佳，則會對台灣經濟有負面影響。

本人於 1976 年離開美國喬治亞大學到伊利諾大學香檳分校任教，伊利諾大學與普渡大學只有一個多小時的車程，所以勝正兄家人與我的家人有極密切的來往，在此期間，勝正兄與我就開始有更進一步做財經政策與學術研究的互動。1987 年，勝正兄在我主編期刊之一 Review of Financial Markets and Policies (RPBFMP) 共同編纂論文專輯“Taiwan's Foreign Investment, Export and Financial Analysis”。1999 年，勝正兄與我在 RPBFMP 編了一期專刊紀念梁前總裁國樹先生，針對梁前總裁國樹先生對台灣學術及經濟發展的貢獻做歷史回顧。

勝正兄、榮義兄與本人的互動值得簡單敘述，榮義兄於 2005 年 2 月被任命為行政院副院長時，同時勝正兄為經建會主委，當時商業週刊主筆李美惠女士訪問榮義兄、勝正兄與我的關係，商業週刊為我們三人 2005 年 4 月份第 908 期特別登出一篇文章，題為「三個『第一』 四十年後同台復活」，在此文章中，我特別強調勝正兄在台大經濟系以第一名畢業，為學業第一；榮義兄在我們班上為身高第一；我則是學號第一。勝正兄在大學時期學業成績的優越表現已為他日後在學術及實務方面的成就與貢獻奠定基礎。

胡院士對我的學術活動有極大的幫助，自 2005 年，我在台北定期舉辦金融與經濟政策研討會，勝正兄即積極參與此研討會。勝正兄曾在 2005、2007、2010、2012 及 2013 年參與此研討會並對台灣財經政策提出

寶貴建言。我記得在 2012 年的研討會中，勝正兄就開始分析台灣在中國投資所面臨的挑戰與困境，並提出有效對策。勝正兄自 1998 年起擔任我財務期刊 *Review of Financial markets and Policies (RPBFMP)* 副主編。他也對我亞太財務、經濟與會計會議 "Conference on Pacific Basin Finance, Economics, Accounting and Management" (PBFEM) 貢獻極大。第二十七屆亞太財務、經濟與會計會議將在 2019 年 6 月 15-16 日於台灣大學經濟系舉辦。我決定邀請吳得民及周鉅原兩位教授為 RPBFMP 編輯一篇特刊，詳載胡院士對台灣經濟政策及學術研究的貢獻。我也同時決定在 2019 年第二十七屆亞太財務、經濟與會計會議為紀念胡院士舉辦特別座談。

勝正兄是我的同學及好友，為人敦厚謙和，深具長者之風，誠為學者從政的典範。好友日已遠，友情永長存。勝正兄仙逝不但是他家人的損失，亦是對國家社會重大的損失。

Dear NATPA Colleagues:

Even though I knew he was not in good health recently, the news that Hu Sheng Cheng passed away still shocked me. I lost a good friend, and everyone lost an outstanding colleague.

I will not elaborate on his contribution as an outstanding scholar and government economist. I just would like to share my experience with Sheng Cheng in early years of NATPA so that we remember his contribution to NATPA.

I served as the 4th president of NATPA from 1983-84. I was very grateful that Sheng Cheng agreed to serve as chair of the Research Committee when I was president. Everyone knows that, of all the NATPA committees, the research committee carries the heaviest workload. Indeed, the NATPA Board charged the research committee to set up a subcommittee to carry out research on the state of Taiwan's democracy. Moreover, there was an election of Legislative Yuan in 1983 and the Board decided to send a delegation to Taiwan to observe the election. A report on the election became an important part of the tasks of the research committee. I remember very well that when subcommittee on Taiwan Democracy was preparing its report on the election, they encountered a thorny issue that 3 members of the delegation who went to Taiwan to observe the election had different opinions on the election. Hu Sheng Cheng, as chair of the subcommittee, had the unenviable task of writing a report acceptable to all the delegates. After many revisions, under the leadership of Hu Sheng Cheng, they were successful in preparing the report. Among many projects that NATPA carried out over the years, I am proud to say that observing election and preparing a report on Taiwan's democracy was one of the most important accomplishments of NATPA.

In March of 1987, NATPA Board appointed a task force to study Taiwan's economy. The task force was chaired none other than Hu Sheng Cheng. The topics under investigation include foreign exchange, export, financial system and environmental impact of economic growth of Taiwan among others. The results of the research were published as a monograph entitled "Taiwan's Foreign Investment, Export and Financial Analysis." The monograph was co-edited by Hu Sheng Cheng and Cheng F. Lee

These are only two examples of how Hu Sheng Cheng contributed to NATPA.

We all miss him dearly.

## Key to Taiwan's Economic Recovery: Transform from Tech-Driven to Value-Driven Economy

**Tain-Tsair Hsu • 許添財**

During the past two decades, Taiwan's economy has suffered a long-term downturn with signs of volatility and vulnerability. Despite consistent growth of ICT exports, the lack of momentum in domestic investments have led to nonstop economic decline with high unemployment and low wages. Meanwhile, with more and more production being offshored to China, Taiwan has been hit hard by the rise of the "red supply chain".

All this shows that the strong ICT foundation does not protect Taiwan from the VUCA (volatility, uncertainty, complexity, ambiguity) syndrome. However, Taiwan can take advantage of the shift from ICT to IOT by restructuring from a tech-driven to value-driven ecosystem.

## Trump Administration Support for Taiwan Despite China's Objections: Context, Status and Outlook

### Robert Sutter



This presentation will assess how the current US government's approach to Taiwan differs from the previous strict interpretation of the One China policy of the latter George W. Bush and the Barack Obama governments; how it compares with previous episodes of strong US support for Taiwan despite China's objections since the normalization of US-PRC relations; and against that background, discern the likely outlook for American policy regarding Taiwan.

**Robert Sutter** is Professor of Practice of International Affairs at the Elliott School of George Washington University. His earlier fulltime position was Visiting Professor of Asian Studies at Georgetown University (2001-2011). A Ph.D. graduate in History and East Asian Languages from Harvard University, Sutter has published 21 books, over 300 articles and several hundred

government reports dealing with contemporary East Asian and Pacific countries and their relations with the United States. His most recent book is *U.S.-China Relations: Perilous Past, Uncertain Present* (third edition: Rowman & Littlefield 2018). Sutter's government career (1968-2001) saw service as the director of the Foreign Affairs and National Defense Division of the Congressional Research Service, the National Intelligence Officer for East Asia and the Pacific at the US Government's National Intelligence Council, and the China division director at the Department of State's Bureau of Intelligence and Research.





## China's Global Threat to Taiwan

### Richard Fisher

China's threat to Taiwan is quickly evolving from one centered on the Taiwan Strait to one emanating from the increasingly global reach of Chinese military power. As China's aggressive economic-to-political-to-military-power building strategy gains it distant military access, reinforced by much larger global power projection military forces, it will have far more levers to influence the security of Taiwan. To continue to deter Chinese attack in the coming decades, Taiwan requires deeper integration into the alliance of democracies and assured access to next generation military technologies.



**Mr. Richard D. Fisher, Jr.** is a Senior Fellow with the International Assessment and Strategy Center. He has previously worked with the Center for Security Policy, Jamestown Foundation China Brief, U.S. House of Representatives Republican Policy Committee, and The Heritage Foundation. He is the author of *China's Military Modernization, Building for Regional and Global Reach* (Praeger, 2008, Stanford University Press, 2010, Taiwan Ministry of National Defense translation 2012). His articles have been published in the *Jane's Intelligence Review*, *Jane's Defence Weekly*, *Aviation Week and Space Technology*, *Armed Forces Journal*, *Far Eastern Economic Review*, *Asian Wall Street Journal* and the *Washington Times*. He received a B.A. (Honors) in 1981 from Eisenhower College.



## How has the 2014 Sunflower Movement Consolidated Taiwan's Democracy and International Relations?

- Analysis of the Discourses Expressed by the Post-1980-Born Youths

**Fang-Long Shih • 施芳瓏**

Dr. Fang-long Shih examines how the 2014 Sunflower Movement has strengthened Taiwan's democratization and international relations by analyzing discourses that expressed by those who were born after 1980 (七年級世代). Dr. Shih discovers that it was a young self of seeing no hope, and also of feeling failure and nothingness. She argues that this empty self is an example of what Sartre (1946) identified as "an existential being". Contained at the occupation site, this being



underwent a self-struggle and re-recognition in an alternative social realm that is separate from political construction and the constraints of nationalist identity. After the Sunflower, that ever-struggling self has realized a common ground, i.e., the natural independence (天然獨), and has further activated and embodied a politics of connectivities as a citizen of democratizing Taiwan as well as a member of international democratic community.

**Dr. Fang-Long Shih** has since 2009 worked as Co-Director of Taiwan Research Programme at London School of Economics and Political Science, UK. She launched the seminar series Taiwan in Comparative Perspective in 2006, and has been acting as chair. Dr

Shih also serves on the Board of Advisors, Global Taiwan Institute, Washington DC (2016–), the Board of Directors of the American Association for Chinese Studies (2016–), and previously on the Committees of the North American Taiwan Studies Association (2013–2015), and of the European Association for Taiwan Studies (2006–2007). Dr. Shih is promoting a 'Taiwan in Comparative Perspective' approach in many European universities, using Taiwan as a point of comparison to build dialogues with the places and countries confronting similar social-scientific issues.

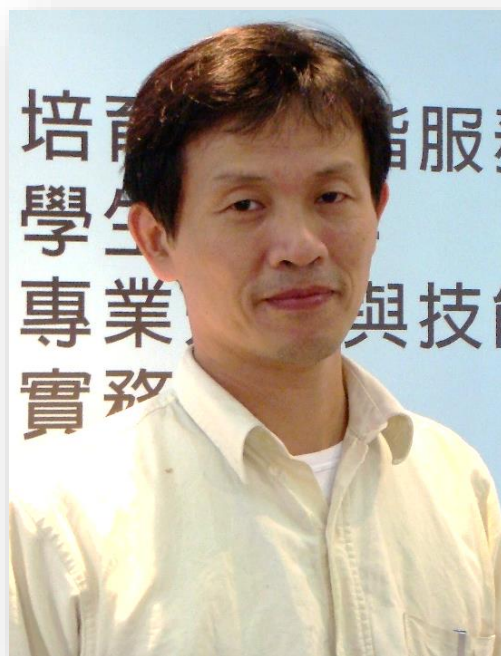

The symptoms of lacking self-confidence of the Taiwanese can be attributed to their source of self-awareness anchored at China, a frame for reference which is diametrically opposed to Taiwan. Many are trapped into the images of a hegemony, such as “huge”, “strong”, “the North”, “politics”, etc. If the economic development is regarded as the most essential basis for Taiwan’s survival, then the positive or negative self-image is going to determine the fate of Taiwan.

Reviewing the perspectives for nationality, history, economic development, international trades, and conglomerate, we provide an analysis that the Taiwanese absolutely can make our own way getting rid of the Chinese myths via a clear self-awareness with our own political economy and geographical conditions.

## Spirit and Contributions of The Taiwan Relations Act:

### An Eyewitness Account

### 見證「台灣關係法」的精神及貢獻

This speech offers the speaker's eyewitness account on the spirit and contributions of The Taiwan Relations Act (TRA). At the time of Congressional debate, this speaker who represented Dr. Kuo Yu-shin, Taiwan's top opposition leader, was invited to get involved in several stages that led to the birth of TRA.

An international law scholar tends to interpret a treaty from national interest. This school of thought is called the international realist's view. However, in the United States, almost everyone interprets from



the spirit and core values of the founding fathers the Declaration of Independence and its subsequent Constitution. This view is uniquely American because the United States of America was built not so much on realism, but greatly on idealism prevailing in 18th Century, which typically consists of the political thought of John Locke, Rousseau, and Montesquieu. Their thoughts were visionally followed through as God-send truth by a trio of foresight: Patrick Henry, Thomas Jefferson, and George Washington. This vision is often not understood or even distorted by the researchers of TRA. Although TRA is an American law offering to Taiwan in simultaneous furtherance of American interest and values, it is more commonly distorted as an international treaty reflecting interests between the United States and Taiwan.

TRA was the uncommon joint efforts and input of two idealistic American giants in Congress – Senator Claiborne Pell and Congressman James Leach. To recognize their enormous contributions, their colleagues in Congress credited both of them “Father of TRA”. And Leach also earned the precious title of “Congressman from the Taiwan District.” Without their uncommon efforts and input, the content of TRA could reflect only US national interest. If so, it could be not much different from the Shanghai Communiqué. And the American values, the values in Declaration of Independence and the Civil War values propounded by President Abraham Lincoln -- “Rebirth of Freedom” and, also, a government “of the people, by the people, and for the people” – could be lost. Besides the United Nations’ core values, Human Rights, including the newfound colonial people’s right, namely, Self-Determination for the people, and its insistence on reliance of peaceful means in solving international dispute, could not be found. Taiwan might once again be an international pawn as it had been, which this speaker hates to see.



The people of Taiwan should not interpret TRA as a product of America's self-interest alone. Rather, extend high marks to friends of Taiwan in Congressional circle and give great credit to American ideals, appreciating it as a gift from Congressional friends of late 1970s, foremost being Senator Claiborne Pell and Congressman James Leach. Both Congressional giants, whom I was fortunately enough to be acquainted with through frequent contacts, whose blending in time of idealism, dedication, conviction, and courage masterfully contributed to a great legal framework solidly transforming Taiwan into a people and a nation of security, freedom, democracy, human rights, and economic sufficiency.

**Mr. Neng-Hsiang Wang** was born Taiwanese (1933) and received education both in Taiwan (National Taiwan University, BA in Political Science, 1959) and in USA (Kansas State University, MA in Political Science, 1967; and The University of Texas at Austin, Master in Professional Accounting, 1972). He is a CPA by profession, running an Accounting firm of his own in Washington, DC since 1984. Established residence in Washington, DC (September 1972) to seek security, freedom, and human rights for his people and his motherland, he luckily witnessed the birth of TRA. Although an accounting pro, he is preferred to spending time for the cause of Taiwan – care for his people. Through involvement in several stages in Congressional efforts stepping into TRA, he is convinced that TRA is uniquely a product of American idealism much more than a product of US national interest.

## The Role of Taiwan under US-Japan Relations and Its Potentials at the Future Perspective of US-Japan Alliance's Indo-Pacific Strategy

**Chih-Cheng Chang • 張智程**

Under the strong influence of China factor, it is essential for Taiwan to maintain a close-knitted relationship with both the U.S. and Japan in order to continue its development and current independent state. Even though U.S.-Taiwan relation constitutes the core of Taiwanese foreign policy, we have noticed a distinctive prospect of change, as Japan transitioning into a more active position in the Indo-Pacific region politically, economically, and on matter of security in response to rising and expansion of China. We have witnessed a rising significance of Japan in Taiwanese foreign policy in recent years, especially in policy and strategy concerning the trilateral relationship between U.S., Japan, and Taiwan. The two most important issues for U.S.-Japan alliance in the Indo-Pacific region are negotiations on trade policy and security issues on how to cooperate under the new "Guidelines for U.S.-Japan Defense Cooperation." Both issues directly implicate Taiwan in significant ways. This research, therefore, intends to deepen the understanding of Taiwan's current and future role under the trilateral cooperation.



**Dr. Chih-Cheng Chang** is a Visiting Scholar at the Fairbank Center for Chinese Studies of Harvard University. He earned Ph.D. degree from Graduate School of Law at Kyoto University in 2016, and worked as assistant professor in the same institution from 2016~2018. He has been invited to be a policy columnist in Thinking Taiwan Foundation, a think tank led by President Ying-Wen Tsai, since 2012. He is also a policy columnist in Hong Kong Economic Journal, publishing commentaries on Japan-Taiwan relations in major Chinese media outlets and journals. As one of the Taiwanese academics of sunflower movement generation based in Japan, he organizes study groups in both Kyoto and Tokyo focusing on Taiwan studies, where hosted dozens of panels and invited many Taiwanese and Japanese writers, scholars, and politicians to share knowledge and experiences. He also has been invited as a speaker in The National Diet of Japan, headquarter of Liberal Democratic Party of Japan, and several policy think tanks in Japan.



## Understanding Taiwanese Public Support for War Against Chinese Invasion

Yao-Yuan Yeh • 葉耀元



Previous literature on war support suggests that one of the most important determinants is war costs, such as combat casualties. However, existing work operates within a context that conflicts occur outside the subjects' territory. We argue that when war directly intrudes citizen's living space, there will be additional determinants in citizen's calculus of war support. Specifically, we contend that mechanisms such as ethnicity, ideology, and sociopolitical factors will alter the public support for war. We employ the case of Taiwan, which is constantly under the treats of the People's Republic of China for "reunification." We utilize ten waves of the Taiwan National Security Survey from 2002 to 2017 to examine our hypotheses, and provide policy implications based on analytical results.

**Dr. Yao-Yuan Yeh** is Assistant Professor of International Studies and Assistant Coordinator of Taiwan & East Asia Studies Program in the Center for International Studies at the University of St. Thomas. Dr. Yeh received his Ph.D. in Political Science from Texas A&M University and a B.A. in Political Science from National Taiwan University. His research centers public opinion, political attitudes and behavior in East Asia and Taiwan, including topics like public support for war, voting behavior, and regime support. Dr. Yeh is also interested in the field of political violence (protest, social movement, and terrorism). He publishes numerous pieces on peer-reviewed journals and is currently co-editing a book on Taiwan with Dr. Hans Stockton entitled *Consolidating a Mini-Dragon: Seventy Years of the Republic of China on Taiwan*. In addition, he is a regular contributor (專欄作家) on multiple Mandarin online/offline platforms, such as 《新新聞》, 《六都論壇》, and 《雅虎論壇》. As a professor, he is enthusiastic to deliver the knowledge and awareness of Taiwan to his students and community.

## 2018 年第 4 屆「NATPA 廖述宗教授紀念獎」

### 「長期貢獻獎」高俊明牧師簡介

高俊明牧師 25 歲台南神學院畢業後，開始在南台灣的原住民山區巡迴傳道，29 歲應聘為花蓮玉山學院教員，培育原住民傳道人才，五個月之後接掌玉山神學院院長。34 歲赴日本鶴川農村傳道神學校進修，35 歲赴英國雪梨奧克學院進修。42 歲被選任台灣基督長老教會總會議長，同年一九七〇年被選為長老教會總會總幹事，擔任該職十九年直至 61 歲退休。

高俊明牧師在總會總幹事任內，發表三次挑戰國民黨的聲明，三次聲明都由總會議長與總幹事具名發表。於一九七一年十二月，台灣被迫退出聯合國之後二個月內，發表第一次「對國是的聲明與建議」，重申尊重人權，台灣的住民有權決定台灣的命運，反對所有出賣台灣的行為，並要求政府內政改革，主張中央民意代表全面改選。一九七五年十一月發表「我們的呼籲」，爭取信仰自由，社會公義與人權，主張唯有我們自己的人民，才有權利決定自己的命運。一九七七年八月再發表「人權宣言」，更進一步主張建立台灣為「新而獨立的國家」。那是國民黨統治三十幾年來，台灣島內第一次公開提出台灣獨立的主張。在戒嚴期間，面對國民黨的高壓統治，二十四小時的監視與威脅利誘，而敢於主動地在六年之間發表三次聲明，由主張國會全面改選，推向主張台灣獨立，為全體台灣人民設想，而不顧一己的生命危險，表現出極度高貴的情懷與超群的智慧與勇氣。



美麗島事件 (1979 年 12 月 10 日) 發生之後第三天，施明德於大逮捕之夜逃脫，高牧師為拯救他而藏匿他，終被國民黨判處七年牢刑。出獄後，高牧師更加積極參與社會運動，加入鄭南榕發起的二二八和平日促進會 (1987, 1989)，要求台灣解除戒嚴，實施國安法 (1988)，積

極推展原住民人權運動，參與反對軍人干政活動 (1990)，加入台大學生的絕食靜坐活動 (1991)，參與推動總統直選 (1992)，應國際特赦組織之邀發表「基督徒的人權關懷」演講 (1992)，參加核四公投千里苦行活動 (1994)，參加公民投票救台灣運動，持續絕食十一天 (1999)，應陳水扁總統聘為國策顧問 (2000)。

高牧師榮獲加拿大 McGill 大學與 Presbyterian 神學院聯合榮譽神學博士學位 (1973)，加拿大 Knox College 榮譽神學博士學位 (1984)，台南神學院榮譽神學博士學位 (1997)，高牧師於 1986 年榮獲台美基金會服務獎與獎金，全額奉獻原住民宣教事工，2001 年獲美國 Union



神學院最高榮譽獎 Union Medal，2006 年獲台灣第十七屆金曲獎「傳統暨藝術音樂作品類最佳作詞人獎」，被選為「疼惜台灣促進會」首任的理事長 (2006-2009)，被選為發展松年大學總校校長，常應邀至台灣各松年大學講課 (1989-2009)，於 2016 年榮獲日本東京青山學院榮譽博士學位。

高俊明牧師是一位德高望眾的人格者，是台灣社會的良心，是台灣人的精神典範，他的英勇和貢獻，是廣為台灣大眾所知和敬佩。如今年近九十的高牧師，長期以來努力不懈，無畏無懼的帶領忠誠信徒和愛台的英勇人士，走在和廖述宗教授所相同秉信的崎嶇艱苦要建立台灣國的道路上。他在長時間裡所呈現的人格特質，對台灣社會與台灣人民的關懷與奉獻，以及不顧自身安危的勇氣，實在令人感佩。北美洲台灣人教授協會肯定他的長期努力，並對台灣有卓越貢獻，因此頒與代表本會最高榮譽的「廖述宗教授紀念獎」的「長期貢獻」獎。

## 2018 年第 4 屆「NATPA 廖述宗教授紀念獎」

### 「青年貢獻獎」林昶佐立委簡介

林昶佐 (Freddy)，1976 年出生。是現任台灣第九屆立法委員，以及閃靈樂團主唱與詞曲創作者。曾獲金曲獎、總統文化獎、歐美、日本搖滾雜誌票選全球最佳主唱等。長期積極參與人權、環保、文化政策等議題運動，也在立委期間大力推動轉型正義。曾任國際特赦組織台灣分會理事長，並創組新政黨「時代力量」。由於其多重身份的特殊性，及所屬的閃靈樂團原具備的國際知名度，他的參選獲得逾百國際媒體報導，成為當年中央大選最受國際矚目的候選人。



他被英國廣播公司(BBC)譽為世界第一位進入國會的重金屬搖滾明星，也被美國有線電視新聞網(CNN)稱為台灣國會最進步的立委之一。

林昶佐從學生時期就積極參與政治與社會活動，2004 年參與李登輝學校青年領袖班，並於 2007 年獲任命為二二八基金會董事。2008 年一月宣佈卸下閃靈團長一職，加入謝長廷總統候選人競選總部，擔任青年部執行長。同年到印度達蘭薩拉拜訪達賴喇嘛，隔年在台灣舉辦「西藏自由音樂會」。2010 年林昶佐獲選為

「國際特赦組織台灣分會」理事長，推動台灣分會改革，廢除讓台灣國家定位尷尬的國際備忘錄，並在國際會員大會當選為亞太主席代表。

林昶佐在 1996 年組成重金屬樂團「閃靈」。閃靈的音樂內容以台灣歷史與神話為背景，旋律編寫融合五聲音階與台灣小調、演歌。閃靈的國際巡迴演唱會相當頻繁，常在國際搖滾、流行音樂報章雜誌曝光。他自 1995 年開始策劃音樂活動、演唱會、音樂節、音樂國際交流。其參與策劃之野台開唱、大港開唱等活動常配合推動文化相關法案、音樂公共議題。於 2005 年縣市長選舉過程中，與許多台灣音樂人、策展人共同成立「音樂文化公民聯盟」，要求候選

人推出音樂文化相關政策。2007 年閃靈將該年的巡迴演唱會定名為「UNlimited Tour」，藉此讓各國樂迷了解台灣受到聯合國（UN）限制（limit）的不公。因此，當年包括「台灣聯合國協進會」以及「UNTC 台灣加入聯合國促進會」等民間組織都邀請閃靈擔任其活動代理人，台灣政府外交機關亦委託閃靈樂團在美國巡迴期間宣達以台灣名義加入聯合國的理念。

閃靈從不避諱表現他們對國際人權、台灣獨立等公共議題的理念，並參與推動相關的社會運動。Freedy 曾發起「Say Yes to Taiwan 台灣魂演唱會」，於「二二八」六十週年參與發起推動轉型正義的「正義無敵音樂會」。並爭取到「西藏自由音樂會」來台舉辦，2009 年再次舉辦「西藏自由音樂會」，並獲第四屆「西藏音樂獎」最佳國際藝人獎。太陽花學運的隔年，他與林峰正等人宣佈成立「時代力量」，同年宣佈參選立法委員。選舉期間受到包括導演魏德聖、張懸、滅火器、黃秋生等多位演藝圈及藝文界友人的支持，並且捐助拍賣品，主持拍賣籌措競選經費。由於宣佈參選後，閃靈樂團的未來動向不明，樂迷要求舉辦「暫別演唱會」，閃靈樂團於是在自由廣場以群募的方式舉辦「鎮魂護國演唱會」，這場演唱會吸引了兩萬餘位樂迷參與，成為國會議員候選人本人開搖滾演唱會的國際首例，再加上閃靈樂團原具備的國際知名度，引發世界各大媒體矚目。

進入國會後 Freddy 仍持續理念，繼續在人權，文化，環保、台灣主權與轉型正義等議題上深耕，並在這方面提出各種進步法案。北美洲台灣人教授協會肯定他的長期努力，並認為他極具潛力繼續為台灣貢獻，因此頒與代表本會最高榮譽的「廖述宗教授紀念獎」的「青年貢獻獎」。





## Metal Politics: From Stage to Congress

**Freddy Tshiong-Tso Lim • 林昶佐**

**Member of the Legislative Yuan, Taiwan**

Freddy once said, “politics and music seem very different; however, they have many similarities.” Since his successful election as legislator, Freddy’s band, Chthonic, have performed far less frequently than before. Now five years since their last album, Chthonic is set to release their new album later this year. In this talk, Freddy will share how his experiences over these five years have influenced this latest work. He will discuss why, despite being just an artist, he founded the New Power Party, now the third largest political party in Taiwan. He will address his vision and mission for the future of the relationship between China and Taiwan, and discuss how the national identity of Taiwan’s younger generation should be understood.

Freddy Tshiong-tso Lim 林昶佐 is the lead vocalist of Taiwanese metal band Chthonic, human rights activist, and legislator representing Zhongzhen and Wanhua districts in Taipei. He is currently a member of the Parliamentary Committee on National Defence and Foreign Affairs. Freddy served four years as chair of Amnesty International Taiwan, is an outspoken environmentalist and advocate of transitional justice. He is a recipient of Taiwan’s Presidential Cultural Award, Best International Artist at the Tibet Music Awards, as well as numerous international rock and metal awards.

**Title:** 獨立的困境：今日的台灣與美國革命前夕的辯論

**The Dilemma of Independence:**

**Today's Taiwan and the Debates on the Eve of the American Revolution**

**Speaker: Feng, Cho-Chien 馮卓健**

PhD Candidate in History, Saint Louis University

#### **Abstract:**

American Revolution was the first successful revolution based on modern political thoughts, and thus became a model for many independence movements. While people tend to think there are stark differences between the situations of today's Taiwan and the North American colonies in 1770s, I will argue that there are similarities between these two situations. As a historian of the American Revolution, I would like to propose a possible connection between today's Taiwan and the eighteenth-century North America, and a lesson we can learn from the American Revolution. It is crucial to study the Loyalist side of the Revolution, just like it is important to understand the ideology that is shared by those Taiwanese who are in line with KMT: where did this ideology come from? How did this ideology make sense of and justify their claims? Historians' job is not to offer moral judgement, but to explain and illustrate historical facts and let the readers make their own judgements. It is really important to study eighteenth-century Loyalist ideology and modern KMT ideology even if we might not necessarily agree with them, because they are powerful and effective in terms of guiding their people's political decisions and thus shape both our history and our current world.

**Bio:** Cho-Chien Feng is a doctoral candidate at Saint Louis University. He received his bachelor's and master's degrees in history at National Taiwan University in 2006 and 2010, and then completed another master's degree in history at Utah State University in 2012. His academic interests include cultural, political and intellectual history of colonial and revolutionary America. He especially interests in examining Loyalist political ideas within their cultural context. Cho-Chien has presented his works in several academic conferences. To name a few, he presented "Loyalist Dialogues with Revolutionaries and the Loyalist Political Culture in Revolutionary New York" at 2015 annual meeting of Organization of American Historians. He presented "Loyalist Cultural Assumptions in New York Loyalist Newspapers, 1774-1776" at "Propaganda, Persuasion, the Press and the American Revolution, 1763-1783" Conference in Hong Kong, China in 2016. He presented "Fear of Anarchy: Loyalist Concept of Limited Liberty" at 2016 Anglo-Taiwanese History Conference in London, England. He presented "Historical Memory and New York Loyalists' Interpretation of the American Revolution" at 59th Annual Missouri Conference on History in 2017. He has presented "Cultural Loyalism in Revolutionary New York," at Front Range Early American Consortium Annual Conference in Boise, Idaho in 2017. Most recently, he has presented his paper, "'Restoring Peace, Order and good Government again in this Country:' the cultural-political assumptions of Anglican





Clergymen in Revolutionary New York” at Religion and Politics in Early America Conference in March 1-4, 2018. His research has been supported by several fellowships. He received residential research fellowship from Robert H. Smith International Center for Jefferson Studies to do research in Jefferson Library at Thomas Jefferson’s Monticello in 2015 and was a Library Resident Research Fellow at the American Philosophical Society in July 2016. He was invited by the David Library of the American Revolution to conduct research there.

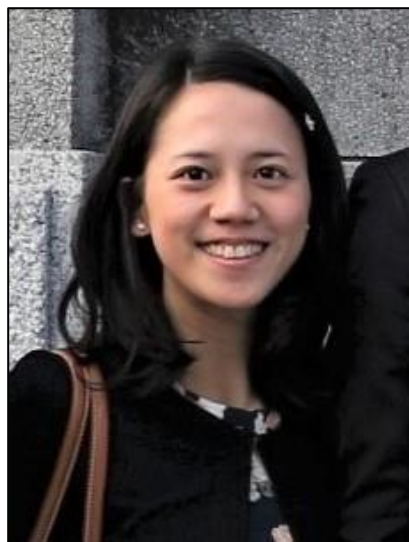
**Collective Memory of Japan’s Colonial Rule in Japan, South Korea and Taiwan**

**Speaker: Ho, Toki Shih-Yi 何時宜**

**Abstract:**

This presentation starts with a simple but complete question: Why do Taiwan and Korea, both Japan’s old colonies, hold different attitudes toward their colonial past? How do the people now, who never actually experienced the period, understand the colonial past? Who decides what to remember, what to forget? Seventy years have passed since the end of Japan’s colonial rule in Taiwan and South Korea. As time goes by, the fragments of the memories of colonial rule are fermenting, being re-introduced and recreated. They have become less personal, but more public, dominating contemporary East Asian politics.



Museums are facilities connecting states and citizens; they collect, research, repair and reinterpret history. This research constructs a framework on how Japan’s colonial rule structures and strengthen the ideology and foreign policy of Japan, Taiwan and South Korea through museum exhibition.

**Bio :** Shih-Yi Ho (Toki) is a geo-data analyst of JAG Kokusai Kogyo, Japan's largest location-intelligence consulting firm. She received her B.A and M.A in International Relations from Waseda University (早稻田大學) and obtained Japan National Qualification of Museum Curator. During her graduate studies, she completed EAU program in Graduate School of Politics and Diplomacy, Korea University. After 10 years of solid academic and practical training in Tokyo, she has moved to Boston in 2017 as an overseas development researcher. She expanded her interest into global information management and has studied at Harvard University as a part-time graduate certificate student.



**Title: Approaches to Regulate Hate Speech in Taiwan**

**Speaker: Chang, Yen-Hsiang 張雁翔**

Doctor of Juridical Science (SJD) candidate, Indiana University Maurer School of Law

**Abstract:**

Taiwan is an emerging democratic country. Taiwanese legal system does not have specific regulation for hate speech. All level courts in Taiwan usually give a broad space for people to comment public affairs or issues, including using hate speech. Some Scholars in Taiwan propose to apply the U.S. legal theory to ban the hate speech, such as critical race theory; but no substantial progress has been seen in the area of hate speech regulation. My presentation will approach the topic from the perspective of comparative constitutional law and determine whether hate speech has the ability to undermine democracy. I will compare freedom of speech rights

in major democracies, such as United States and Germany, in order to explore the diverse attitudes to regulating (or not) hate speech. I conclude the presentation with a constitutional design argument aiming to identify the approach most suited to dealing with hate speech in Taiwan.

**Bio:** 張雁翔 Yen-Hsiang Chang, is a SJD candidate at Indiana University Maurer School of Law. He received an LLB and LLM from Soochow University School of Law, and an LLM from University of Minnesota School of Law. His research interests are Constitutional Law, Comparative Constitutional Law, Administrative Law and International Human Rights Law. Also, he is a Taiwanese lawyer, he was a Pro Bono Lawyer for the protesters in the Sunflower Student Movement in 2014. He represented Democratic Progressive Party in the congressional investigation for the March 23 Incident relating to students' occupation and eviction of the Executive Yuan during the Sunflower Student Movement. Further, He was a Committee Member of Taipei Bar Association Human Rights Committee and currently is an Alternate Director of Taiwan Forever Association.



### **Promoting US-Taiwan Relations: American Exchange Experience and FAPA**

#### **Abstract:**

This is a story of how a once politically apathetic youth found her affirmation of national identity grew stronger after she came abroad. Shelly Lu, a former exchange student in Illinois State University shares her experience of advocating Taiwan in the US context. After exposing to the social justice movements in her college campus, she learned about the internal struggles of the American society. She then approached to deeper cultural conversations like the contested American foreign policy and Taiwan. After she finished her exchange program this May, she decided to come to DC to gain practical experience in the field of international relations. She wanted to do something more for Taiwan, something that's substantial in improving US-Taiwan relationship. At that time, the Taiwan Travel Act just passed unanimously in Congress, and it was where her journey with FAPA begin.....



**Bio:** Shelly Lu is currently a summer intern at Formosan Association for Public Affairs. At FAPA, she has assisted congressional visits and engaged in thinktank conferences. Her area of focus is US-Taiwan-China trilateral relationship. She is a rising senior majoring in Social and Public Affairs at University of Taipei. #### **Abstract:**

### **Title: Writing Taiwan from the Margins:**

**Hybridity and Anti-Nationalism in Wu Zhuoliu's *Orphan of Asia* and Zhu Tianxin's "The Old Capital"**

**Speaker: Lu, Nick T. C. 呂宗哲**

Ph.D. in English Language & Literature, University of North Texas

#### **Abstract:**

My paper studies how the idea of Taiwan as a nation is narrated from the minority point of view. In it, I examine Wu Zhuoliu's *Orphan of Asia* and Zhu Tianxin's "The Old Capital." Wu's novel was completed and published at the end of Japanese colonial rule while Zhu's story was written in the post-martial law, democratic Taiwan. Both texts, I argue, form a strong counter-narrative to question the totalizing and homogenizing nationalist discourses in their different time periods, Japanese imperialism, Chinese nationalism, and the newly arisen Taiwanese



nationalism. In this paper, I rely mainly on Homi Bhabha's concept of hybridity to examine how both texts, by highlighting the hybrid experiences of the Taiwanese people, unsettle the pedagogical nationalist narrative that seeks to represent Taiwan as a linear, homogenous society. At the end, I conclude that both author's emphasis on Taiwanese hybridity opens up a productive space for the reader to think beyond essentialist categories of people, culture, and nation. In doing so, their works also help point towards a more cosmopolitan future Taiwan.

**Bio:** Dr. Lu is a literary critic and postcolonial scholar by training. He has recently earned his Ph.D. in literature from University of North Texas by successfully defending his dissertation, "Constructing Taiwan: Taiwanese Literature and National Identity." Dr. Lu's research interest includes postcolonial literature and theory, ethnic studies, nationalism, and globalization. His latest academic essay on Nigerian woman novelist Flora Nwapa is forthcoming in spring 2019.



### **Title: Embodying Nostalgia: Taiwanese Immigrants' Practice of International Folk Dancing in California**

Ph.D. candidate in Critical Dance Studies, University of California, Riverside

#### **Abstract:**

Folk dancing is often postulated as a means of representing its performers' ethnic identities. It is also frequently used by state regimes to raise national awareness and to promote a sense of collectivity among its people. However, this was not the case in Taiwan. During the Taiwanese Martial Law Period (1949-1987), international folk dancing (土風舞), instead of Taiwanese traditional dances, was the dance form popularized and supported by the Taiwanese government. Currently in California, some Taiwanese immigrants are still practicing this dance form as a means of connecting with people who share similar cultural backgrounds.



Taiwanese people's practice of international folk dancing in California casts new light on the production of national identity. In the case of international folk dancing, the notion of "Taiwanese-ness" as identity carries different implications since the presentation of this dance genre was international and not national. In this essay, I draw on first-hand interviews with Taiwanese international folk dancers in California to ask how they conceive of and enact "Taiwanese-ness" by remembering their dancing experiences in Taiwan and embodying this dance practice after their migration. I reiterate that not only the notion of "Taiwanese-ness" is dynamic, understanding of international folk dancing is also unstable. In addition, I maintain that these immigrants' shared experience of international folk dancing is a "memory in practice" that strongly demonstrates a sense of transpacific in this dance form and as a part of "Taiwanese-ness."

**Bio:** Wei-Chi Wu is a Ph.D. candidate in Critical Dance Studies at the University of California, Riverside. She completed her M.A. at the National Taiwan University of Arts, and was certificated the Primary Level Instructor in Folk Dance by the Taiwanese Sports Administration, Ministry of Education in 2013. She is currently a member of the Taiwan International Folk Dance Association and the Orodancer Folk Dance Group, and she owns teaching experiences in both Taiwan and the United States. Wei-Chi's research interests include examination of

international folk dancing in both Taiwan and the United States (mainly in California), and the relationships between international folk dancing, Taiwanese identities, transnationalism, and nostalgic memories.



**Title: Teaching English as a second language through critical literacy:  
a pathway to global citizenship education**

**Abstract:**

The content and the teaching theory used in teaching English as a second language has been subject to changes in Taiwan due to the influence of globalization. Global citizenship education provides a teaching framework to help students with their intercultural competency and understandings of global issues, and critical literacy offers an alternative theory that focuses on the way language and power function in our societies rather than literal meanings. While the literature has established views on the objectives of global citizenship education and critical literacy, less is known about how English teachers foster these global mindsets and critical skills in classrooms. The purpose of this research is to provide an overview of a lesson plan, aiming to prepare English as a second language learner to become responsible global citizens and critical consumers of information.

**Bio:** My name is Wu, Yu-Chieh. I have a MA in Psycholinguistics from the Edinburgh University, and I am currently pursuing another MA in Education at the University of Hawaii at Manoa. Before coming to the United States, I worked as a high school teacher at Matutina Girls High School, Yilan High School, and Taipei First Girls High School in Taiwan for six years. I became interested in international education after my three years of experiences as an international exchange program coordinator at the Taipei First Girls High School. I believe that a society full of citizens who respect cultural diversity will make our world more equitable. In the future, I hope that I can contribute to Taiwan's education using my experiences and to cultivate younger generations to be more compassionate and open-minded towards different cultures.



**Title: 從楊小娜的《綠島》看台灣文學非虛構寫作的其他可能性  
Other Possibility of Creative Non-Fiction in Taiwan Literature from “Green Island”**

**Abstract :**

2016 年台籍美國人楊小娜出版了《綠島》，而 2017 年幼獅文藝舉辦了全台的非虛構寫作徵稿。觀察臺灣近十年的出版市場，在此之前已有大量的介在紀實文學與史料和小說間的新的文學作品誕生，臺灣似乎吹起了一陣非虛構寫作的風潮。回顧台灣寫實主義文學的發展，非虛構寫作的脈絡上承自 1990 年代的報導文學，時至今日業已 20 年的文學生產體系，紀實文學的「寫實精神」如何在非虛構的美學層面中突顯？



而非虛構文學強調的歷史真實性又何以必須透過虛構的主人公來賦予？非虛構文學中的虛構性與海外華人的文化認同是否形成一套對抗「華人離散」的敘事策略？就此上述多個問題，本篇論文嘗試賦予非虛構寫作一普遍的定義，討論海外的台灣文學非虛構寫作呈現了何種不同於台灣島內寫作的歷史關懷：如何重新看待台灣二二八事件、白色恐怖，與美援計畫在台灣的历史軌跡。透過作者既在島內又在島外的族裔身份，其寫出的戰後台灣政治史，其與島內台灣文學又是如何相互融涉。

**Bio :** Tsai, Min Ying 蔡旻螢. I am a M.A. student in Taiwan Literature at National Taiwan University, focusing on postwar modern literature and Taiwanese Cultural phenomena. I am currently working on my master's thesis which mainly discussing the relationship of sexuality and Americanness in 1970s of Taiwan in Wang, Chen Ho's (王禎和) works.



**Title:** 淺談地球科學在台灣的应用

**Abstract:**

地球科學在台灣一直都是冷門的學科，從大學以來身旁的親戚朋友總是會問我：「所以念地球科學可以幹嘛？」相對於其他熱門的工程學科，地球科學的存在總是相對顯得單薄。然而在台灣，地球科學仍存在著其不可取代的重要性。

地球科學除了在傳統土木工程、工程地質上的應用之外，地球科學更在災害防治上扮演著重要的腳色。身處於板塊交界處，地震頻繁，根據地質調查所的地質調查報告，台灣目前已知有三十三條活斷層，近二十年來歷經了集集地震、台南地震、花蓮地震，除了有地震速報之外，我們更是能從這些地震了解地震發生的機制，針對地質敏感區進行地質安全評估來預防災害的發生。而在這些天災防治上面，除了地震災害外，土石流預警、土壤液化潛勢也是對於國土自然資源保育上重要的應用。而除了傳統地質上的應用之外，也希望能探討其他地球物理、地球化學等地球科學在台灣的应用。

**Bio:** 鄭哲宇 Jeng, Jer-Yu obtained her Bachelor of Science degree in Earth and Environmental Science from National Chung Cheng University in 2014. Before joining Michigan Tech, Jer-Yu was a research assistant in Paleomagnetism Lab, Institute of Earth Sciences, Academia Sinica where she worked on the magnetism, age and nannofossil of south-west region sediment in Taiwan Strait. In 2016, she joined Michigan Tech to pursue the Master of Science program in Geophysics. Jer-Yu is working on the characterization of the near surface fracture using the radial anisotropy of seismic S-waves.



## **Title: Electricity Market Restructuring: What can Taiwan Learn from the 20-year Experience in the US?**

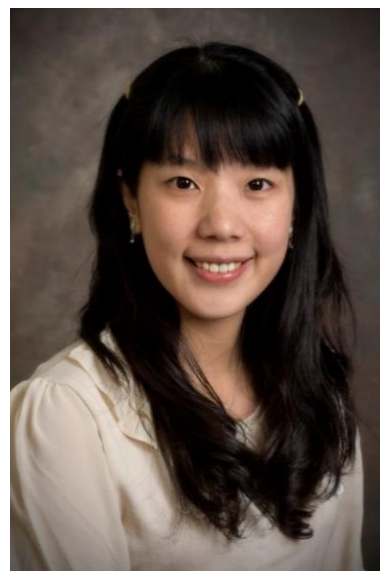
**Speaker: Chen, Wei-Ming (Katty) 陳韋名**

Associate Policy Scientist, Energy and Environmental Policy, University of Delaware

### **Abstract:**

The electric industry in Taiwan has been monopolized for more than seven decades and is currently standing at the crossroads of market restructuring with the aims of improving electricity supply efficiency, adjusting electricity price, diversifying primary energy sources for electricity generation, reducing greenhouse gases emission, improving services as well as encouraging innovation. This presentation will start with a theoretical framework and explain the differences among market deregulation, liberalization, and restructuring. Then use US electricity market as an example to illustrate various types of market and the management ideologies. Also, the factors that impact retail prices will be discussed based on Delaware's electric market, which was restructured in 1999. This presentation will provide information for Taiwanese people to understand the electric market and conclude with policy implications for the Taiwanese government for future management.

**Bio:** Dr. Chen has a strong interest in energy policy research, especially renewable and energy efficiency policies. She received her Ph.D. from the University of Delaware, and her dissertation is titled: Mapping Alternative Energy Paths for Taiwan to Reach a Sustainable Future: an Application of the LEAP Model. After graduating, she conducted a carbon trading project and a national energy program to facilitate the development and employment of renewable (offshore wind, geothermal, and ocean energy) and low-carbon (carbon capture and storage) technologies in Taiwan. In August 2016, she joined the Center for Applied Demography and Survey Research at the University of Delaware. Her research focuses on the US electricity market and Delaware-specific environmental and energy issues. As an early-career professional, she devotes herself to continued learning and contributing to the field of the electricity industry, particularly the integration and promotion of distributed energy resources.



## **Topic: Possible Application of Automated Vehicles for Limited Land Space in Taiwan**

Ph.D. candidate in Civil & Environmental Engineering, University of Wisconsin-Madison

### **Abstract:**

Travelers usually make several consecutive trips in their daily life every day. For example, a traveler might plan to go to a grocery and pick up their child on the way home from work. Trip chain (tour) can be defined as a sequence of trips that begins at home and ends at home and has at least two stops. When travelers need to visit several places in a tour, they are more likely to choose drive alone than other mode such as bus or other public transportation systems because of the convenience for Privately Owned Vehicle. It could result in severe traffic jam and need more parking lot space, especially for Taiwan with limited land. Nowadays, automated vehicles become more and more popular in the world, and could be widely used in the near future. In my research, the potential reduction of traffic jam and parking lot space using shared automated vehicles to serve travelers through each stop will be examined. With better understanding of trip chain travel behavior and trends,





transportation planners could make better transportation policy, arrange the shared automated vehicles and set reasonable price and rule to serve travelers and reduce the market share of drive alone.

**Bio:** 林俊瑋 Lin, Chun-Wei is currently a PhD student in the Department of Civil & Environmental Engineering at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He earned his master's degree in traffic and transportation from National Chiao-Tung University in Taiwan, and in computer science from University of Wisconsin-Madison. His research focuses on data analysis, machine learning, optimization, freight transportation, supply chain management, and logistics. He has also participated in the Taiwanese Puppet Troupe at UW-Madison for several years.



### **Title: Learn from BioClusters in the U.S. – Strategies for Taiwan's Rising Biotech Industry**

Ph.D. candidate in Biomedical Engineering, The University of Texas at Austin

#### **Abstract:**

Yen-Liang will share his observation on the development of biotech industry in Texas and analyze the major bioclusters in the U.S. This talk will cover: (i) cluster effect in biotech innovation, (ii) overview of Texas Medical Center ecosystem, (iii) major and emerging bioclusters, (iv) overview of Taiwan's biotech, and (v) strategies to grow Taiwan's biotech. He will also introduce the Taiwanese Biotechnology Associations (TBAs) and its advocacy for Taiwan. TBAs is the FASTEST growing Taiwanese professional community worldwide. Founded in 2012, the first TBA, Boston Taiwanese Biotechnology Association (BTBA) aims to foster individual career development, to enhance scientific collaborations, and to strengthen networking among academic and industrial bioscience communities in Taiwan and the US. These core values were quickly recognized by the young talents around the world. Later, a series of TBAs was initiated in Texas, southern California, Europe, Bay Area, Central United States, and Taiwan. All the associations hold their own annual symposiums attracting totally more than 1000 Taiwanese professionals each year.

**Bio:** Liu, Yen-Liang 劉彥良 received his B.S. degree in Life Science and MS degree in Biomedical Engineering from National Taiwan University. His master's thesis was focused on lung tissue engineering and alveolar angiogenesis. He also participated in a clinical research of stem cell therapy for knee cartilage regeneration. He is currently a Ph.D. candidate in the Department of Biomedical Engineering, the University of Texas at Austin. His research focuses on instrumentation of advanced fluorescence microscope and its application in cancer diagnostics. He is also the co-founder of Texas Taiwanese Biotechnology Association (TTBA) that has hosted 5 conferences, 16 seminars, invited 61 speakers, attracted 600+ attendees, and partnered with 8+ organizations in the U.S. and Taiwan. Together with other 7 TBAs around the world, they aim to forge a biotech community to raise talents, build successful careers, and help Taiwan to advance her biotech industry.

**Title:** 台灣健保支付制度改革之跨國比較分析

**Abstract:**

自從台灣開辦全民健保後，不僅降低民眾就醫的障礙、提升醫療的可近性，亦達成低廉的醫療佔 GDP 比重與高品質的醫療服務，使台灣健保成為世界的健康保險制度模範之一。然而隨著人口老化、醫療科技進步等因素導致醫療費用節節上升，要如何兼顧支出、公平、效率與品質，挑戰日益艱鉅。醫療照護體系的永續發展不僅是台灣的問題，也是世界各國正在面臨的挑戰，因此各國在現有基礎之上提出許多新型態的健康照護政策。本次報告希望透過探討台灣與各國支付制度改革的異同與成果，為台灣健保找出永續發展的可能性。

**Title: Novel Use of High-Intensity Focused Ultrasound (HIFU) on Cancer Treatment: A Possibility of Precision Medicine in Taiwan**

論台灣精準醫療新秀：海扶刀之新癌症療法

**Abstract:**

Precision medicine, defined as “right drug, right dose at right timing to right patient”, has become a rapid developed and popular global trend for cancer treatment since 2015. In the same year, Taiwan has introduced a new knife-free treatment – High-intensity focused ultrasound (HIFU). Nowadays, hospitals in Taiwan has used HIFU to treat uterine fibroids clinically by focusing high energy on the uterine fibroids and removing them with high temperature achieved at the focal point. In this study, alternative cancer treatment strategy combining HIFU with chemotherapy has been developed. Instead of utilizing the heat to directly ablate tumor tissues, here we integrate magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) with significantly greater contrast enhancement than the state of art, as well as targeted delivery of theranostics to desired tissues in response to stimulation by MRI-guided HIFU, to selectively kill cancer cells. My vision is to transfer this novel HIFU cancer treatment developed in laboratory to both clinical medicine and industry in Taiwan.

**Bio:** 程吉安 Chi-An (Annie) Cheng received her B.S. and M.S. degree from National Taiwan University, Taipei, Taiwan, in 2009 and 2011, respectively. During her master degree's study, she worked in the Institute of Atomic and Molecular Sciences, Academia Sinica under the supervision of Prof. Huan-Cheng Chang, where she focused on advancing fluorescent nanodiamonds in the area of bioimaging. After 4 months of visiting to Georgia Institute of Technology, she went back to Taiwan and worked as a patent engineer at Jianq Chyun IP Group in Taipei for 2 years. She then decided to pursue her Ph. D. study in the Department of Biomedical Engineering at University of California, Los Angeles, working with Prof. Jeffrey I. Zink. As a Ph. D. candidate, now she is working on 8 projects at the same time and hoping one day she can develop theranostics materials that can be used in clinical for cancer treatment.



### **Title: Preventing Disability in Late Life**

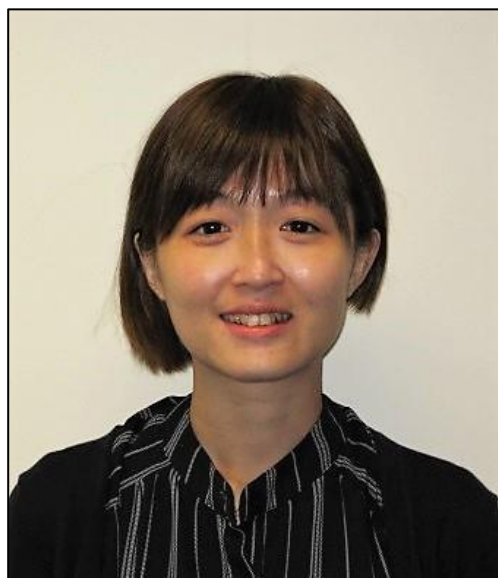
#### **Abstract:**

**Introduction:** One-third of older adults are at-risk of disability. Disability prohibits older adults from living independently and often results in the need for costly supportive services. Minimizing disability is critical to reduce costly healthcare and maintain quality of life into old age. However, the effects of non-pharmacological interventions on delaying disability are less understood in at-risk older adults. Furthermore, the influence of active ingredients (i.e., the determinants of intervention efficacy) within interventions are rarely explored. These gaps have hindered the implementation of effective interventions designed to reduce disability in late life. **Research**

**aims:** I examined the effects of non-pharmacological interventions on disability in older adults and explored the effects of active ingredients within interventions on disability.

**Conclusions:** Few non-pharmacological interventions showed promise in minimizing disability for older adults. Interventions that incorporated exercise, problem-solving, cognitive behavior therapy and environmental modification were associated with stronger magnitudes of effect sizes. To optimize the effects of non-pharmacological interventions for aging population, I recommend: (1) the development of universal criteria for "older adults at-risk of disability;" (2) the specification and evaluation of active ingredients in complex interventions; (3) the inclusion of sensitive measurements to capture the trajectory of disability in late life.

**Bio:** I am a licensed occupational therapist and a third-year doctoral student in the Department of Occupational Therapy, University of Pittsburgh. My expertise lies in aging, disability, intervention development, and repeated measures analysis. My career goal is to become an independent scientist who examines the prevention of





disability for older adults with chronic conditions, especially those with cognitive and affective impairments. My research interest is inspired from my clinical practice. I was a clinical practitioner for 2.5 years, focused on reducing disability for older adults with severe disability in Taiwan. During this time, I found that disability was commonly experienced among older adults. These clinical observations led me to pursue a research career to advance my learning on aging and disability research. My future research interests address three foci. First, the development of future longitudinal studies to examine changes of patterns of daily activities over time. Second, the selection of specific biological, clinical and behavioral factors to be studied to elucidate complex disablement processes in late life. Third, the structure, timing, and risk population of future interventions that aim to prevent disability in late life.



**Title:** 台灣人口高齡化與退化性關節炎的預防和治療探討

**Speaker:** Lee, Ming-Song 李明崧

Ph.D. candidate in Biomedical Engineering, University of Wisconsin-Madison

**Abstract:**

退化性關節炎 (Osteoarthritis) 乃不可逆之軟骨異常損耗且為世界最常見的骨骼疾病之一，其所造成的痛楚，源自於骨骼與骨骼間，因缺乏軟骨緩衝之摩擦所致。根據衛福部統計，台灣約有 350 萬人飽受關節炎疼痛之苦，佔台灣總人口數的百分之十五。目前為止，並無任何一種有效藥物能根治此疾病，且導致軟骨損傷退化的機制也尚未明確。故預防及治療退化性關節炎成為了當今相當重要的課題。運動、飲食、穿著、體重等，皆為預防退化性關節炎的相關因素。治療退化性關節炎可劃分為兩個方向，分別為建立退化性關節炎細胞模型和透過幹細胞進行退化性關節炎之軟骨重建。為了有效地尋找病因以及預防退化性關節炎，建立其細胞模型便可以進行正常人與退化性關節炎病患之軟骨差異分析。另一方面，誘導型多功能幹細胞因其多重的分化能力，為軟骨組織再生燃起了新的希望。本研究希望透過幹細胞之再生能力，於病灶處對軟骨細胞及組織重建，進而修復關節軟骨的問題，以緩解國人因退化性關節炎所造成之痛楚。



Osteoarthritis (OA) is a disease characterized by irreversible cartilage degradation. A hallmark of OA progression is the transformation of quiescent chondrocytes to hypertrophic chondrocytes leading to the cartilage fibrillation and calcification. The mechanisms governing OA progression remain unclear. The primary aim of this study was to establish an OA disease model. Our hypothesis was that blood-derived mesenchymal stem cells obtained from donors with knee OA retain critical genomes which lead to OA progression. The significantly higher level of anabolic and metabolic gene expression related to cartilage degradation was found in all OA-derived chondrocytes. In summary, using the defined condition, our method can be easily used for the production of OA patient-specific iPSCs and further derivation of adequate clinical-grade MSCs and chondrocytes for experimental trials.

**Bio:** Ming-Song Lee (Terry) received his bachelor and master degree in department of biomedical engineering and department of nanotechnology in Chung-Yuan Christian University, Taiwan. He is currently a second year Ph.D. student in the department of biomedical engineering at University of Wisconsin-Madison, and a member of the Orthopedics Research Society and International Chinese Musculoskeletal Research Society. He has published 4



papers and 10 abstracts. The focus of his current research project is to regenerate articular cartilage for osteoarthritis (OA) treatment. This project is currently under investigation and hold several potential results are potentially contributed to the field of biology, physiology, and pathology.



**Title: Treatments and Prevention of Epilepsy in Taiwan**

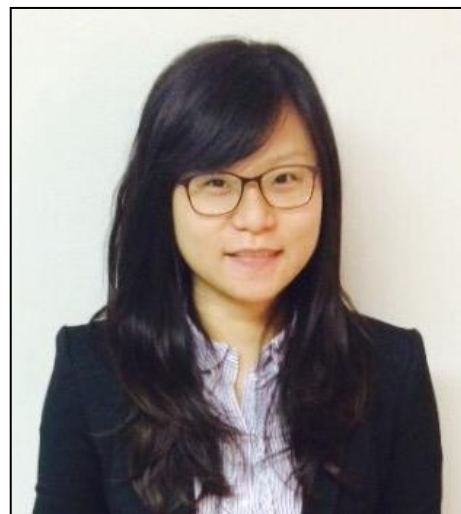

**Abstract :**

Epilepsy is one of the most widespread and debilitating neurological diseases that affects 50 million people worldwide. Nearly 80% of epilepsy cases are reported in low- and middle-income countries. In Taiwan, approximately 0.14 million people have epilepsy that need treatment and the prevalence and incidence of epilepsy are significantly higher in East Taiwan. Epilepsy is a chronic condition characterized by recurrent and unpredicted seizures occurring due to abnormal electrical activity in the brain. There are many types of epileptic seizures that differ in etiology, symptoms, and severity. The common signs include abnormalities in consciousness, perception, and behaviors. In some types of seizures, loss of consciousness, muscle twitching and repeated jerking are frequently observed. This disease largely affects the life quality of the patients and their family and causes a heavy burden to the society. Epilepsy is not contagious. Current knowledge indicates that approximately 60% of epilepsy is idiopathic, and 40% stems from developmental or acquired conditions such as a stroke, traumatic brain injury, infections, tumor, drug withdrawal, neurotoxicity, or prolonged seizures and genetic defects. While antiepileptic drugs allow for symptomatic control of seizures, epilepsy remains incurable, partially due to our poor understanding of the molecular and electrophysiological basis of epilepsy development. In addition, the social stigma and discrimination further hinder the treatment of this disease. Advances in our understanding of the pathology of epilepsy and overcoming the stigma around epilepsy are crucial for developing more effective interventions for epilepsy and related brain disorders.

**Bio:** Shu-Hui Chuang (莊淑惠) joins the Medical Sciences program at Texas A&M University as a Ph.D. student since 2013. She is focusing on epilepsy studies with an emphasis on neurosteroid interactions with inhibitory GABA-A receptors. Shu-Hui was born and raised in Taoyuan, Taiwan. She completed her bachelor degree in Microbiology and Immunology from National Chiayi University and received her master degree in Physiology from National Cheng Kung University. She serves as the president of Texas A&M Taiwan Study Club focusing on promoting Taiwanese awareness and values and a member of the Formosan Association for Public Affairs. When not working, Shu-Hui enjoys travel and outdoor activities.



**Title: From Taipei water park explosion to learning from Nature:  
Finding the common road to regenerative wound healing  
從台灣八仙塵暴至拜大自然為師: 找尋傷口再生之道**

Postdoc in Regenerative Medicine, University of Southern California

**Abstract:**

Taiwan demonstrated its world-class medical advance in treating mass burn patients when the colour dust explosion occurred in 2015. However, the current treatment can only facilitate a large skin wound to repair rapidly, skin appendages and functions (hair, sweat glands, flexibility etc.) are not restored in the resultant scar. The nature has fostered a few unique animal species that demonstrate remarkable ability to regenerate; a salamander can fully re-grow a severed limb, and a specialized African spiny mouse (acomys) can regenerate its skin after losing up to 70% of it. The common laboratory C57Bl/6 mouse can regenerate some hair follicles after wounding, but they are restricted to the center of the wound. In human, fetus and newborn have shown to heal scar-free, signifying the potential capacity for us to regenerate. Adult humans, on the other hand, show very limited ability to regenerate hair follicles after wounding. Furthermore, we are also prone to scarring, especially on body regions with high skin tension. Though we are very different from the salamander or an African spiny mouse, there are still common grounds and lessons to be learned from our nature. In my presentation, I will share how I find the common cues in nature's regenerative model species, and how the stiffness of the tissue may

be an overlooked secret in unlocking the hidden potential of our system to skin regeneration.



**Bio:** Hans is a Taiwanese Canadian growing up in various cultural, demographical and geographical settings. Attended McGill University in Montreal, Canada before returning to Taiwan to obtain his PhD and learn about his roots. He takes pride in cycling, running, hiking, swimming and engaging through various remote townships in the mountainous terrain and waterbodies of Taiwan. Enjoys standing at the interaction where history and culture meet the new and diverse world. Has welcomed more than 100 backpackers from worldwide to his living room in Tainan and Los Angeles. Loves the nature with a passion and likes to embrace that

with some form of physical and mental activity or challenge. Strives to live a holistic and faithful life of academics, athletics, and arts. Currently working as a post-doctoral fellow at the University of Southern California in Los Angeles, trying to utilize his lifelong interests in biomechanics and curiosity for the nature to provide a unique peak into the mesmerizing world of regenerative medicine.
